Dear Friend,

I hope this email finds you well. I am writing to invite you to our upcoming event in the Hamptons for Seed Global Health, the organization founded by Vanessa Kerry. Seed Global Health is the only non-profit working in close partnership with the Peace Corps to address the dire shortage of nurses and doctors in resource limited countries around the world.

We are hosting a small cocktail party on Sunday, August $16^{\mbox{th}}$ at The Quogue Club at Hallock House to raise funds and awareness from my friends there. We would like to raise \$100,000 to help fund our mission. We have already lined up several chairs and hosts, and each will bring in a few guests. I hope you will consider supporting Vanessa's project by joining us.

Over the past three years, we have sent over 100 physicians and nurses into the field. We have also helped offset over \$2.5 million of their debt, often a barrier to public service. Events like this are critical to our ability to continue to be successful improving health globally. Thank you for your consideration.

The World Health Organization estimates that in 57 countries around the world, there is a critical shortage of 2.4 million doctors, nurses and midwives. In Tanzania, for example, there are only 24 nurses and one doctor for every 100,000 people. We urgently need to address this critical shortage through training and professional development. We deploy US physicians and nurses for one year placements to serve as faculty at medical and nursing schools in Malawi, Tanzania and Uganda. Volunteers also provide direct medical care. Seed Global Health provides debt repayment support through private philanthropy, to ensure that financial debt such as educational loans or mortgages are not a barrier to participating among these committed individuals.
